THE committee, appointed to enquire what laws have or will expire this session, beg leave to report, that the following laws will expire with the close thereof: An act concerning estates tail, and the jurisdiction of the county courts, passed June session, 1773. An act for the speedy recovery of small debts out of court, passed June session, 1777. An act for the relief of those who have and may suffer by the British army, passed June session, 1780. An act to continue an act for the regulation of officers fees, and for other purposes, passed October session, 1780. A supplement to the act for the regulation of the staple of tobacco, passed October session, 1780. An act for the trial and punishment of spies, and such as may join the enemy, passed May selfion, 1781. An additional supplement to the act for the regulation of the staple of tobacco, passed May session, 1781. An act to continue and explain the powers vested in the special council appointed on the eastern shore, passed May session, 1781; and the supplement thereto, passed same session. An act for suspending the powers of the commissioners for building the court-house and prison in Harford county, passed March session, 1774.
