fuch merchant or merchants shall be liable to pay the same rate as by this act is imposed on the property of other inhabitants of this state; and the assessor shall return a distinct account thereof to the commissioners of the tax for his county; and such merchant or merchants may discharge the same, in paper money or specific articles, at the rates by this act ascertained. Provided always, and be it enacted, That where ships or other vessels are not in harbour, or view of the assessor, during the period of assessment, if such ship or other vessel asterwards arrive during the year, the same shall be rated as soon after the arrival as may be, together with her lading of merchandise on board; and return shall be made to the commissioners of the tax, who shall give a note thereof to the naval officer of the district next adjacent; and such ship or other vessel shall not clear out, until the assessment on vessel and cargo be paid; but such ship or other vessel, last mentioned, or the cargo on board, shall not be assessment appeared as sollow:
