

talions; and every person, having such property, who doth not find himself a musket and bayonet, with a cartridge box, or powder-horn and bag for ball, within six months after notice given him of this act, and of his obligation to do so, by the lieutenant of his county, or the eldest field officer of his battalion, shall be fined the sum of five pounds current money; and such fine may be recovered in the same manner as other fines are directed to be recovered by this act, and shall be applied to the purchasing of arms and accoutrements for such company; and arms and accoutrements as above, sufficient for the rest of the militia, shall be procured, at the expence of the state, by the lieutenants of the several counties, or in such other manner as the general assembly shall hereafter direct, and shall be under the care of the several lieutenants of the counties respectively, and shall be marked with the name of the county and number of the battalion to which they belong; and all persons of the militia, having muskets or other firelocks, or hand guns, shall be and are hereby obliged to bring the same to the field, on days of exercise either in company or battalion, under the penalty of for every neglect or refusal, to be levied and applied as heretofore is directed."
