The engrossed bill No. 12, was read and assented to, the paper bill so endorsed, and sent to

the senate by Mr. Stone and Mr. Coursey.

The bill to appoint an intendant of the revenue, was sent to the senate by Mr. Duckett and Mr. Causin.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning to o'clock.

## F R I D A Y, January 18, 1782.

HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolve respecting the per diem allowance, was sent to the senate by Mr. Taylor and Mr.

curred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto.

A petition from Archibald Golder, late a captain in the extra regiment, relative to his pay while in service, was preferred and read, and referred to Mr. Forrest, Mr. Quynn, and Mr. Norris, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Jeniser, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee, to whom was referred the petition of Robert Dick, beg leave to report, that they are of opinion, that a law ought to pass, empowering the petitioner to collect the debts of the companies in his petition mentioned; that his accounts with those companies ought to be adjusted and audited by the auditor-general, and when audited and adjusted, the debts collected in the first place to be retained to the use of the petitioner, and the balance, if any, to be paid into the hands of the treasurer of the western shore, subject to the disposition of the general assembly. It does not appear to your committee, nor do they believe, that any debts are due from the companies associated to any subject of this state, except to the petitioner, and if there are, he as a partner must be answerable. And it is the opinion of your committee, that no suit ought to be brought before the first day of June 1783, unless the debtor resuses to settle his account, or is about to remove out of the state. All which is submitted to the consideration of the honourable house.
