

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER, 1781. 73

The bill for the relief of Patrick Hamilton, John Page, Clement Beall, &c. was read the second time and passed. Sent to the senate by Mr. Duvall and Mr. Coursey.

A letter from his Excellency the governor, dated in council, January 18, 1782, enclosing accounts of Isaac M^rHard and Joshua Frazier, was laid before the house and read.

The supplement to the act to raise the supplies for the year seventeen hundred and eighty-two, was read the second time and passed.

The amendments to the bill to regulate the militia were read the first time, and, on a second reading thereof, the 1st and 2d amendments were agreed to; the 3d amendment being read, the question was put, That the house agree thereto? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Oneale appeared as follow:

The engrossed bill No. 14, was read and assented to, and sent to the senate, with the paper bill thereof, by Mr. Ridgely and Mr. S. Worthington.

On motion, the question was put, That the bill to obtain an equal valuation of the land in this state according to its actual worth, be referred for consideration to the next session of assembly? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Chafe appeared as follow:
