So it was determined in the negative.

Whereas the general assembly, at their last session, authorized and requested the governor and council to give their orders for the furnishing major-general Smallwood, during his command in this state, with necessaries for his table at the public expence, **RESOLVED**, That the governor and the council be requested to procure the sum necessary for that purpose by a sale of any of the specific supplies.

Sent to the senate by Mr. Causin and Mr. Jenifer.

On motion, the question was put, That the conferrees from this house, on the subject of the bill for the appointment of an intendant of the revenue and all public monies, be instructed to propose to the conferrees of the senate, to add a clause to the said bill to abolish and repeal so much of the act to raise the supplies for the year seventeen hundred and eighty-two as relates to the appointment and duties of the commissary, and to make it the duty of the intendant aforesaid to perform the several matters and things required of the said commissary, and to alter the said bill for the appointment of an intendant conformably thereto? **Resolved** in the affirmative.

Mr. Stevenson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act for the payment of the journal of accounts; which was read the first and second time by especial order and passed.

The engrossed bill No. 26, was read and assented to, and sent to the senate, with the paper bill thereof, by Mr. Coursey and Mr. Stone.

The bill for the payment of the journal of accounts, was sent to the senate by Mr. Stevenson and Mr. Duckett.

The house having received information, that in some counties of this state, where persons are appointed commissioners of the tax, justices of the peace, and justices of the orphans court, in settling the levy, allowances are made to such person or persons for attending on one and the same day in all or some of those capacities, **RESOLVED**, That the taking such treble, or even double allowance, is, in the opinion of this house, improper, and ought not in future to be made in laying and assessing the public levy.

ORDERED, That a copy of the above resolve be sent to each of the clerks of the county courts in this state.

The engrossed bill No. 23, was read and assented to, the paper bill so endorsed, and sent to the senate by Mr. Sprigg and Mr. Brogden.

The bill to continue the act therein mentioned, was read the second time by especial order and will not pass.

The message from the senate, relative to the bill to regulate the militia, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house agree to the amendments as proposed by said message? **Determined** in the negative.

ORDERED, That Mr. Frederick Green, printer to the state, do print the laws and votes and proceedings of this session of assembly on or before the twentieth day of April next, and that he also print the votes and proceedings of all former sessions of assembly, which have not been heretofore printed, on or before the first of August next.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be requested to furnish the printer with paper sufficient for the above purpose.

The bill to establish the credit of a bank, was read the second time and will not pass. Sent to the senate by Mr. Tilden and Mr. Hawkins.

ORDERED, That the bill to remedy the inconvenience arising to the inhabitants of Cæcil county from the loss of their records, &c. and the further supplement to the act for the advancement of justice, be referred for consideration to the next session of assembly.

William Hindman, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill to appoint an intendant of the revenue, &c. with the following message:

By THE SENATE, JANUARY 21, 1782.

GENTLEMEN,

WE have agreed to receive the clause in the bill for appointing an intendant, respecting the power of the intendant and his assistant to examine and curtail accounts against the public, and to countersign orders, as it hath been amended in consequence of the conference, and have passed the bill as it now stands.
