ORDERED, That all petitions and reports on petitions respecting accounts, be referred to the intendant of the revenue, to take order therein, and to pass or reject the same in the whole or in part.

Whereas the general assembly did appoint Matthew Ridley, Esq; to be their agent in Europe, and made no allowance or commission to him for his trouble, therefore RESOLVED, That there shall be allowed to the said Matthew Ridley, Esq; a commission of ——— per cent. on all loans by him obtained for the use of this state, and a commission of ——— per cent. on all military stores, cloathing, or other things, by him procured for the use of this state. The question was put, That the subject matter thereof be referred to the next session of assembly? Resolved in the affirmative.

On progression in reading the bill to settle and pay the civil list, &c. the question was put, That the assistant clerk to the council be struck out? Resolved in the affirmative.

Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill to raise recruits, endorsed; "By the senate, January 17, 1782: Read the first time and ordered "to lie on the table.
