THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

James M'Henry, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the engrossed bill No. 52, with the paper bill thereof, which engrossed bill was thus endorsed; "By the senate, June 15, 1782: Read and assented to.

Which engrossed bill was read and assented to, the paper bill so endorsed and sent to the senate by Mr. Bayly and Mr. Duckett.

On the second reading the bill for the sale of certain confiscated British property, the question was put, That the following clause be struck out? "And be it enacted, That the tenants on manors and settlers on reserves shall have the preference of purchasing such parts of any manor or reserved lands as they are now settled on or occupy, on paying such reasonable and moderate valuation therefor (upon the terms aforesaid as to the days of payment) as the said commissioners, or persons nominated by them, shall on oath determine; but if they refuse to purchase, upon notice given in the news-papers as aforesaid, the said commissioners may sell the same in the best manner and on the best terms they can procure, consulting with and taking the direction of the intendant in the management of the business aforesaid." The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Forrest appeared as follow:
