- No. 32. An act for vesting an estate in fee simple in Eleazer M<sup>c</sup>Comb, in one lot and a half of land, lying in Chester-town, in Kent county.
- No. 33. An additional Supplement to the act to settle and adjust the accounts of the troops of this state in the service of the United States, and for other purposes.
- No. 34. An act for the relief of Richard Richards, a languishing prisoner in Frederick county gaol.
- No. 35. An act in favour of ~~the~~ M. P.
- No. 36. An act for the liquidation and payment of debts against persons convicted of treason.
- No. 37. An act to suspend the collection of the tax from certain persons who have suffered by the enemy.
- No. 38. An act allowing a longer time to compound on old certificates, and making further regulations respecting the sale of vacant lands.
- No. 39. An act for the speedy application of the monies appropriated for repairing the streets in Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county.
