Mr. Speaker (with the rest of the members) returned and resumed the chair.

ORDERED, That Mr. Chase wait on the council, and inform them, that the general assembly are of opinion, that the election of the governor be notified to the citizens of this state by proclamation issued to the sheriffs of the several counties, to be by them published, by the sheriff of Anne-Arundel county on this day, and by the other Sheriffs on Saturday the 14th day of next month. The house adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.
