On motion by Mr. Lloyd seconded by Mr. Coursey, the question was then put on eighteen shillings and six-pence. The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. B. Worthington and seconded by Mr. Lloyd appeared as follow :

The house being equally divided, the question was determined in the negative by the honourable speaker.

On motion by Mr. Done seconded by Mr. Hindman, the question was then put on nineteen shillings. Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Oneale seconded by Mr. Dashiell, the question was put, That the allowance for flour be fifteen shillings per short hundred? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Dashiell seconded by Mr. Stone, the question was put, That thirty shillings current money be imposed for every hundred pounds of property in this state? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Hindman seconded by Mr. Dashiell, the question was then put on thirty-five shillings. Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Stone seconded by Mr. Oneale, the question was then put on twenty-five shillings. Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Lloyd seconded by Mr. Dashiell, the question was put, That five shillings part of the twenty-five shillings be paid in specie? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Hall seconded by Mr. Chase, the question was put, That the collectors of the tax receive the specifics? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Chase seconded by Mr. Done, the question was put, That the collectors be allowed four and a half per cent. for collection? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Chase seconded by Mr. Hindman, the question was put, That one fifth of the whole assessment be remitted to the continental treasury, for the payment of the army? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Lloyd seconded by Mr. Hall, the question was put, That the commissioners to value the lands within this state be named in the bill? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Chase seconded by Mr. Dashiell, the question was put, That three commissioners be appointed to value the lands within this state? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Coursey seconded by Mr. Lloyd, the question was put, That four commissioners be appointed (two on the eastern shore and two on the western shore) to value the lands within this state? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Lloyd and seconded by Mr. Kent appeared as follow :
