than the performance of that duty under the obligation or compulsion of any positive law. Wc cannot therefore, for these reasons, recede from this amendment.

John Henry, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr Speaker the following letter from his Excellency the Count de Rochambeau, to the honourable the President of the senate and Speaker of the house of delegates.

I RECEIVE with great gratitude the marks of esteem and friendship that you are so good as to bestow on me and all the French army. If we have been happy enough to co-operate, for the advantage of your country, in the different positions in which we have been with the American army, under the orders of his Excellency General Washington, we have only filled the pure and generous intentions of the king our master towards his allies; but we acknowledge likewife, with the greatest satisfaction, that the state of Maryland, in all the occasions that the army has passed through it, has not only been ever ready to furnish it with all the things belonging both to war and their own daily consumption, but that the French troops have been received with that cordiality, friendship, and hospitality, which could only be bestowed upon allies that are both beloved and esteemed. I beg of you, Gentlemen, to receive kindly all the assurances of the eternal gratitude that I and the troops which I have had the honour to command, will entertain of all your favours.

Annapolis, Jan. 8, 1783.
