"And be it enacted, That certificates issued to officers and soldiers of the Maryland line, or detached corps, to the amount of fixty thousand pounds, be received into the treasury from such officers and foldiers as may now hold the same, and that they be allowed to take affignments of the bonds of persons who may have purchased confiscated British property for red money to that amount, and shall stand in the place of the state, to whom such bonds were originally granted."
