MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS,

THIS house propose going into the appointment of two delegates to congress, on Monday next at 10 o'clock, in the room of the honourable Edward Giles, deceased, and the honourable William Hemsley, who has resigned.

John Henry, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to change the surnames of Nicholas Maccubbin, junior, and of James Maccubbin, to that of Carroll; which was read the first and second time by especial order and passed.

Mr. Quynn, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report: THE committee, to whom was referred the memorial of Thomas Ruffell and William And gustine Washington, beg leave to report, That the facts in the said memorial, are truly stated. Your committee conceive, that as the memorialists are entitled to undivided parts of the preparty of the Principio company, it would be improper to fell the faid lands upon terms to which the memorialists have not consented. Your committee also find, upon converseson with a conmissioners of confiscated property, that the lands ordered by the law to be fold are entaigled with other surveys, and their limits uncertain, and cannot be ascertained at the day appointed for the fale. Your committee are therefore of opinion, that the commissioners be directed to postpone the fale of the property late belonging to a company diffringuished by the appellation of their riaeipio company, until the further orders of the general affembly. Your committee find, that the money intended to be raifed by the sale of this property was appropriated to discharge platelistics months pay due to the officers and foldiers of the Maryland line, and therefore think is decouling to substitute some other fund in lieu thereof. Your committee beg seave no recommend where honourable house, that the residue of the specific tax now due and to be willed ed or betilied in the hands of the collectors, be applied to this purpose. That the commissioners streethersite of British property be directed to sell, as foon as possible, any consisted property that is not heretotore appropriated, upon the same terms, and for the same purpose, that the property late belonging to the Principio company was directed to be fold; and that if a sufficient sum of money should not be raised by the aforesaid means, that the intendant of the revenue be directed to fell as much of the specifics (except the article of tobacco) now on hand, or to be collected, will make up the deficiency; and that any money that may come into the hands of the fi dant, or into the treasury, not particularly appropriated, may be made the treasure fulfilling the purpose aforesaid.
