The question was then put, That a salary of one hundred and ninety-five pounds be allowed the clerk to the governor and council the ensuing year? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was put, That a salary of fifty pounds be allowed the messenger to the governor and council the ensuing year? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was put, That a salary of one hundred pounds be allowed the clerk of the senate the ensuing year? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That a salary of seventy-five pounds be allowed the clerk of the senate the ensuing year? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That a salary of sixty pounds be allowed the clerk of the senate the ensuing year? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was put, That a salary of one hundred pounds be allowed the clerk of the house of delegates the ensuing year? Resolved in the affirmative.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Duckett. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Quynn, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, A Supplement to an act for the benefit of Mrs. Rebecca Hanson and Miss Catherine Dulany; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The petition from a number of inhabitants of Caroline county, distinguished by the name of Nicolites or New Quakers, referred from the last to the present session, was read, and referred to Mr. Keene, Mr. Lethbury, and Mr. Hopper, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Mordecai Goswell, of Baltimore county, setting forth, that while in the execution of his duty as a deputy collector, he was robbed of a sum of money belonging to the public, and praying relief in the premises; was preferred and read, and referred to Mr. M^e Mechen, Mr. J. Stevenson, and Mr. Wootton, to consider and report thereon.

The engrossed bills No. 2 and 3, were read and assented to, and sent to the senate, with the paper bills thereof, by Mr. Wootton and Mr. Sullivan.

On motion, the question was put, That each delegate to congress for this state be allowed the sum of fifty shillings for every day he shall attend, or be on his journey to or from, congress? Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That each delegate to congress from this state be allowed the sum of forty shillings for every day he shall attend, or be on his journey to or from, congress? Determined in the negative.
