Worthington, Mr. M'Mechen, and Mr. Carrol, to confider and report

On motion, ORDERED, That Mr. B. Worthington, Mr. Lethibury, Mr. M'Mechen, Mr. Kent, Mr. W. Stevenson, Mr. Wootton, and Mr. Carroll, be a committee to confider and report ways and means for the establishing permanent funds for the payment of the civil list.

The petition of Edward Lloyd, Esq; was withdrawn with leave.

## R I D A Y, November 28, 1783.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yester-

day were read. Mr. Digges has leave of absence till Tuesday next.

A petition from James Hagan and others, of Charles county, praying an act may pass to record and make valid a certificate of division between them, was preferred and read, and referred to Mr. Ware, Mr. Dent, and Mr. Oncale, to confider and report thereon.

Mr. Hindman, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following re-

port:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of William McCreery, beg leave to report, that they have examined the faid petition and account therewith exhibited, and find that the faid William M'Creery, in the year 1776, did go supercargo of the brig Brith, loaded on account of this state, for the purpose of procuring arms, ammurition, &c. to the island of Martinique, and from thence to Bordeaux in France, and from thence to Amsterdam in Holland, at which last place he effected the object of his instructions, and further invested the sum of £. 147 0 2 of his own money, and the sum of £. 76 13 4 the property of Mr. Hugh Young, the owner of the said brig, which in all make £. 223 13 6, as will appear by an account duly proven and passed, and herewith annexed, which said money was laid out in goods then wanted by the public, and all the faid goods were delivered to the agent of the public at Annapole. Your committee further report, that the said petitioner hath, at different times, made application to the governor and council, and intendant, for a delivery of faid goods, or the value thereof in current money here, which they refused to deliver or pay, alleging that they had no power to pay more than the money advanced in Amsterdam. Your committee are therefore of opinion, that the said M'Creery having laid out the sum of £. 223 13 6 in Holland, in good, which were delivered to the agents of the state, ought to be allowed a reasonable advance on said goods, with interest on the same from the delivery of them until the time of payment, as well on his own behalf as on behalf of Mr. Young; and that the governor and council be authorised and empowered to fettle and adjust the same by arbitration or otherwise. All which is submitted to the honourable house.
