The order of the day being read, the bill to provide a permanent fund for the further encouragement and establishment of Washington college, was read the second time, and the question put, That the faid bill do pass? The year and nays being called for by Mr. Kidgely appeared at

Sent to the senate by especial order by Mr. Lethrbury and sour other members. John Henry, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE intendant of the revenue, in discharge of his duty, begs leave to lay before the ho-

nourable the general affembly the following report:

That it appears by the returns of the commissioners of the tax for the year 1780, the property of the state was then estimated to 15,889,079 o o specie; in the year 1781, to 12,682,581 0 41;

in 1782, 11.747.493 5 0; and in the year 1783, to 11,371,615 5 1.
No. 1. That there are in circulation of the bills of credit emitted in consequence of a resolve of congress of the 18th of March 1780 (and commonly called state continental) the sum of 32,750 2 4. That the surplus of the tunds appropriated for the sinking of this emission amounts to 10,455 11 0, as will appear by account No. 1.

2. That there are in circulation of the vills of credit emitted by act of affembly of June seffin 1780 (commonly called black money) the fum of 28,375 11 11. That the furplus of the fundi appropriated for the finking of this money amounts to 27,548 15 8, 28 will appear by account

No. 2.

That there are in circulation of the bills of credit emitted by act of affembly of May selfion 1781 (commonly called red money) 8,726 19 9. That the surplus of the sunds appropriates for the finking of this emission amounts to 125.493 13 10. There is also in the treatury 8,250 is specie, paid in for the recemption of this money, which may be applied either to the to demption of the bil's of this emission, or to the payment of 7,050 18 13 principal, and 1,478 4 10 in e eft of eignt per cent, due thereon to tueferibers who paid in their subscriptions; & they might be allowed either to let their money remain in the office at 6 per cent. or receive the fums paid in, at their e ection.

That there is due to fundry persons, for certificates liquidated under the act of May sessia 1781, of principal money, 111,811 15 1, and interest thereon to the first instant, 6,238 3, making the sum of 118,049 18 1.

Teat there is due in continental money, for loan-office certificates, and the certificates for the payment of the journals of accounts, including interest, 115,125 10 7 continental currency, and 4,841 19 specie, added together will probably make 20 000 specie.

That there is due in bills of exchange for the emission of 1767, called out of circulation, the

fum of 1,825 12 5 sterling, equal to 3.042 13.

That here is due to citizens of this state, creditors of congress under the act of November selfion 1782, 92,603 12 5, and interest thereon (for which there are not funds specially provided) to t e itt inftant, 6,992 8 3, making the sum of 99,596 0 8.

That there is due to persons who lent tobacco to this state, 90,541 to, equal at 30 per cent.

to 1.358 2 3 specie.

That there have been issued to the officers and soldiers of the Maryland line, including those issued to officers and soldiers of the quota of the state of Maryland who were serving in other eorps, 254,982 5 03, 4 years and 3 months interest thereon, 65,020 8 4, making the sum of 320 002 13 43. There have been redeemed of these certificates 68.590 17 7; so that there remained a balance due the officers and folciers the 1st instant, including interest, 251,411 16 5.

The funds pledged for the redemption of this debt are part of Monocacy manor, unbonded, amounting to 12 602 10, part of My Lady's manor fold, 2,841, part of My Lady's manor un-

fold, and confiscated property in Czecil, the whole may amount to 30,000.

That the in endant has drawn orders on the treasurer of the wostern shore for 41,158 12 specie, and 13.414 16 9 specie certificates, as may appear by book No. 6.

That the unliquidated debt due from the state, including officers and foldiers depreciation,

may amount to 35,000. That there is due to Messieurs Vanstaphorsts, as securities for money borrowed in Holland,

including interest to the 1st of September 1784, 24,80t sterling, equal to 41,336 current money. That the civil list, as settled in 1783, amounted to 6,250, of which there has been paid ". \$100; there remains a balance due of 150.
