The following message being prepared, was sent to the senate by Mr. E. Gantt.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 7, 1784.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS, THE recommendation of congress of the 18th of April 1783, to the several states in the union, to authorife their respective delegates to subscribe and ratify an alteration in the eighth article of the confederacy, and to substitute in lieu of that article another, to make the number of inhabitants under certain modifications the measure of contribution for each state, appears to this house to be a matter of great importance to this state, and that it merits the most deliberate determination of the general affembly; and therefore we propose to your honours a conference respecting the subject, and the propriety of this state's adopting or rejecting the said recommendation. If this proposal for a conference be agreeable to your honours, we have appointed Mr.
