YOUR committee report, that they have examined major Davidson respecting his knowledge of the petitioner, and the subject of the petition, and find that the petitioner deported himself, during a long service in the Maryland line, as a brave, faithful, and active soldier. That in process of time he proquied a substitute, and though he remained in the army until his substitute was disciplined and properly initiated in the line of his duty, yet it appearing that are engagement mu t foon take place, he, full of that noble ardor which possessed the advocates of liberty, would not avail himfell of his discharge, but bravely stayed and supported the cause of his country at the battle of Cambden. That some time after his return to Saint Mary's country, a se low-soider called John Blair, under pretence of a journey by land to Alexandria, borrewed the petitioner's difehange, which in those days operated as a pass, promising to deliver it to him on his return. That it further appears, said discharge has not been restored, but from every circumstance, that faid Blair, under colour of faid discharge, obtained from the then auditorgeneral continuates to the amount of Guibert's pay, and converted the same to his own use. That it appears Guidert never authorised said Blair to receive his certificates. That the only mode of relief, in the opinion of your committee, would be to order the present auditor-general to issue certificates to Guibert to the amount of his pay due him, and at the same time to advertile those furreptitiously obtained, which in all probability would bring them back to the origi-
