

rer hath received from the naval officers, 14 0 0 in bills made 8th June 1780, 201 15 8 in bills made 18th March 1780, 248 0 0 in bills made 10th May 1781, and the further sum of 19352 10 8 in specie; for marriage licences, 40 1 6 in bills of credit made 8th June 1780, 512 8 0 in bills of credit made 18th March 1780, 77 18 0 in bills of credit made 10th May 1781, and 102 16 6 in specie; for ordinary licences, 390 6 10 in bills of credit made 8th June 1780, 377 18 4 in bills of credit made 18th March 1780, 99 5 0 in bills of credit made 10th May 1781, and 460 0 11 in specie; for fines and forfeitures, 62 10 7 in bills of credit made 10th May 1781, and 18 19 6 in specie; for interest received on old loan-office bonds, 105 0 0 specie; and from William Matthews, one of the persons concerned in robbing the treasury, which was found in his possession on being taken, 7 6 5.

That your committee find, certificates agreeable to the act to adjust the debts due from this State, have been issued to sundry persons to the amount of 21.814 6 6; certificates agreeable to the act proposing to the citizens of this state creditors of congress on loan-office certificates, to the amount of 31,243 19 2 $\frac{1}{4}$; and certificates for the payment of the journal of accounts, paid sundry claimants, amounting to 665 12 6.

That certificates granted according to the acts of assembly of this state, have been discounted with the several collectors thereof to the amount of 300 0 0 continental currency, and 6708 6 3 specie, on account of taxes: and that officers and soldiers certificates, amounting to 23,769 1 11 have been received on account of confiscated property sold for their redemption.

That your committee have counted and burnt the sum of 3787 12 9 of the bills of credit made by an act of assembly June session 1780, 5067 17 11 of the money made by congress 18th March 1780, 5893 16 5 of the bills of credit made 10th May 1781, and the further sum of 334 8 9 in bills of credit made by the acts of assembly and resolves or convention of this state.

That it appears to your committee, by the accounts of the said treasurer, that on the 8th day of May last, the sum of 173 6 5 specie was taken out of the treasury by robbers. That he hath paid away from the 25th of November 1783 to the 24th of November 1784 inclusive, the sum of 58,597 11 8 specie, for all which payments have been produced to your committee the necessary vouchers and receipts; and that there remains in the treasury a balance of 8271 1 3 in old continental money, and 50,585 4 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ specie, appropriated in the following manner, viz.

For the payment of the journal of accounts, November session 1783,	149 3 11

That it also appears to your committee, there is the sum of 8850 0 0 in the treasury, of the money made by congress 18th of March 1780, it being part of the $\frac{1}{10}$ of the bills which became issuable in exchange for old continental money, and appropriated for the purpose of calling out of circulation the bills of credit emitted by the acts of assembly and resolves of convention of this state, and the further sum of 3614 8 4 in said bills, paid in on account of British creditors, which sums remain unapplied.

That your committee have examined the accounts of tobacco with said treasurer, and find by an account settled by the committee of claims the 25th of November 1783, there was a balance of 15 hogsheads of crop tobacco, weighing 14,830 lb, and 16,993 lb of transfer tobacco, remaining in the treasury, also 176,425 lb of transfer tobacco in the hands of the commissioners of the tax of the several counties.

That it appears to your committee, by said accounts, that there hath been paid away, from the 25th of November 1783 to the 24th of November 1784, fifteen hogsheads of crop tobacco, weighing 14,830 lb, and 17,240 lb of transfer tobacco. That the commissioners of the tax have paid away and accounted for the quantity of 76,035 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb of transfer tobacco, for which payments have been produced to your committee the necessary vouchers and receipts. That there is due to the commissioners of Calvert county 1303 lb of tobacco, and that there remains the quantity of 101,691 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb of transfer tobacco in the hands of the commissioners of the tax of the several counties to be accounted for.

Your committee beg leave further to report, that they have examined the books in the old loan-office, and find there is due on the several bonds taken by the commissioners, in virtue of an act of assembly passed at November session 1769, for bills of credit, bills of exchange, and gold and silver, lent out on bond to sundry persons on interest at 4 per cent. per annum, and compared the same with a list thereof now remaining in the office ready for the inspection of the honourable house, amounting to 4,683 5 6 sterling; and that by accounts in said office it appears, there has become and still remains due from sundry persons on the before mentioned bonds, to the first of December 1784, the sum of 1301 0 0 sterling for interest.

That your committee have also examined the several bonds taken by the commissioners for bills of credit emitted in virtue of an act of assembly passed November session 1773, and compared the same with a list thereof now remaining in the office, to the amount of 6378 15 0 sterling, and that there has become and still remains due from sundry persons on said bonds, to the first of December 1784, the sum of 1697 0 0 sterling for interest.
