

That it appears to your committee, there is due from the supervisors of the public roads in Baltimore county 378 1 8 sterling, from the supervisors of the road to the westward of Fort Cumberland 31 14 9 sterling, from the supervisors of the poor-house in Baltimore county 2,00 0 0 sterling, from the supervisors of the public roads in Frederick county 1374 17 10, sterling. That there is also due on said books from sundry sheriffs 1880 19 3 gold currency, and from the collector of the land-tax in Queen-Anne's county for the year 1763 the sum of 73 17 2 gold currency.

That it appears to your committee, there is due to sundry claimants on the journal of accounts for 1766 the sum of 568 2 8, and the sum of 424 7 2 currency due to sundry claimants on the journal 1773.

Your committee further beg leave to report, that from the multiplicity of business, the nature of the trust, and the care and regularity of the treasurer's transactions, they are of opinion his salary for the year 1784 was very inadequate to the services he rendered the public, and are of opinion an additional allowance ought to be made to him for an assistant, who was necessarily employed in transacting of said business.

THE committee of claims having taken under their consideration the memorial of Mr. John M'Lure, merchant, Baltimore, beg leave to report, that they have examined the accounts and papers, and find, that Mr. M'Lure had several transactions in continental money with this state, previous to a scale of depreciation being established by law; that Mr. M'Lure hath made application to the intendant, who has referred settling his accounts, from conceiving the act of May session 1781 precludes Mr. M'Lure from any advantage he could derive from his state of depreciation. Your committee beg leave to observe, that allowing Mr. M'Lure's claim, would be laying a foundation for a general revision of all transactions in continental money, and would overthrow the line as to creditors established under the above recited act. Your committee hand in with this report an account stated by the intendant of the several transactions with Mr. M'Lure. All which is submitted to the honourable house.
