Gentlemen, WE are induced to propose an amendment to the bill for altering the time of holding the courts in the counties therein mentioned, from information that the bill, as passed by you, will exclude a gentleman of the law, who resides in Alexandria in Virginia, and practices in Prince-George's county, from attending this court or that of the county where he refides, as they will both be held on the same week in the month of April, which would be injurious not only to the practitioner, but also to those whose business is committed to him, and will also deprive a practitioner of the law, who is a member of this house, of the opportunity of finishing his business at the next eastern shore general court. These inconveniences will be remedied by the amend-
