COMMISSIONERS appointed by the general affembly reported to the last fession, that the post road leading from Baltimore-town to the river Susquehanna was in many places almost impassable, that the distance would be greatly shortened, and many hills avoided, by straightening the same, and encouragement given towards building good bridges over the creeks by private subscription. Public notice has been given of the intended application to the legislature, and no opposition having appeared, we are of opinion that no great damage to individuals can be apprehended, but on the contrary, that great benefit will accrue to the public by ftraightening and amending the same; and as the road is now much worse than when the commissioners made their report, we are apprehenfive that, without some aid from the general affemply, it will sook be impossible for carriages to pass; from these considerations we have returned the bill for straightening and amending the faid road, and hope you on reconfideration will give it your affent.
