

The petition of Thomas Russell and William Augustine Washington, was referred to Mr. Joseph Dashiell, Mr. Waggaman, Mr. Carroll, Mr. M'Mechen, and Mr. Norris, to consider and report thereon.

The petition from the tradesmen and manufacturers of Baltimore-town, was referred to the committee appointed to receive and examine any proposal for the establishment of manufactories, and to consider and report the best means for setting on foot manufactories, and promoting the trade and commerce of this state, to consider and report thereon.

On the second reading the report on the petition of Isaac Redgrave and Benjamin Hatcheson, the question was put, That the house concur with the first clause in the said report? Resolved in the affirmative.

The report on the petition of Isaac Redgrave and John Wallis, was read the second time and concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto.

The petitions of William Rafin and William Maxwell, and John Rolph and Benjamin Hatcheson, were referred to Mr. Lethbury, Mr. Joshua Seney, and Mr. Jones, to consider and report thereon.

The bill to establish permanent salaries for the chancellor and the judges, was sent to the senate by Mr. Goldsborough.

On motion, the question was put, That the governor be allowed twelve hundred and fifty pounds? Determined in the negative.

On motion, the question was put, That the governor be allowed one thousand pounds? Resolved in the affirmative.

On the second reading the bill to settle and pay the civil list and other expences of civil government, the question was put, That the treasurer of the western shore be allowed five hundred pounds? Resolved in the affirmative.
