

180 VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER, 1785.

ORDERED. That Mr. Quynn, Mr. N. Worthington, and Mr. B. Worthington, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The following question being propounded to the house, viz. That leave be given to bring in a bill for the regulation of the poor in the several counties of this state, for the relief of indigent mariners, and for the repairing of the poor-house in Baltimore county, the previous question was called for and put, That the said question be now put? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Quynn, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act for building a new prison in the city of Annapolis; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Samuel Hughes, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill allowing a longer time to compound on old certificates of survey, endorsed; "By the senate, February 15, 1786: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MARCH 6, 1786.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS,

WE have returned the bill for the regulation of the poor in the several counties of this state, for the relief of indigent mariners, and for repairing the poor-house in Baltimore county, with a negative on the first reading, being of opinion that it is a money bill, and ought not to originate in your house.

Impatient to put an end to the session, we must defer deliberating on any subjects but such as cannot in their nature be postponed.

Sent to the senate, with the bill for the regulation of the poor in the several counties of this state, &c. and the bill to continue the acts of assembly therein mentioned, by Mr. Wheeler.

Mr. Secret, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to alter and amend the laws respecting commerce and imposing duties; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to invest the United States in congress assembled with a power to levy, for the use of the United States, particular duties on certain enumerated articles, and five per cent. on all other foreign merchandise, imported into this state, was read the second time, and the question put, That the said bill do pass? Resolved in the affirmative. Sent to the senate by Mr. Ramsfy.
