" That a bounty of three-pence per yard be given in each county in this state, to the person or persons owning the same stock in partnership, who shall, in the same county, weave of his or their own property, or have the same wove at the same place, the greatest quantity, not being less than 8000 yards, of square wove linen, not less than one yard and one inch wide, so that the thread or yarn of such linen be spun in the county where the bounty is applied for. A bounty of 2½d on the next greatest quantity, not less than 6000 yards. A bounty of 2d on the next greatest quantity, not less than 4000 yards. A bounty of 2d per yard on the next greatest quantity, not less than 2000 yards. And the like bounties on cottons and woollens, or a mixture of them. Also a bounty of 4d per pair on every pair of mens or womens cotton, thread,
