BY THE SENATE, JANUARY 19, 1786.

GENTLEMEN, WE think the allowance of seventeen shillings and six-pence per day to the members of the general assembly, for their attendance this session, is too high; and we have therefore dissented to your refolve for this purpofe.

At a time when our treasury is exhausted, and the weight of taxes complained of, there is a necesfity to reduce the expences of government. It appears to us improper that an allowance so high should be made the members of the general assembly, especially as allowances to many officers have been lessend, and as another session is proposed by you in the course of this year, which would ex-

tremely increase the public expence.

We will consent to a resolve allowing sourteen shillings per day to the members of the general asfembly, and have returned you the journal of accounts, that if you agree to such allowance the proper corrections may be made. The charge to Job Garretson of £. 388 15 83, for keeping prifoners and deserters, we think improper to be put on the journal of accounts, as we see no reason to distinguish Mr. Garretson from other public creditors, and we wish his account should be examined by the officers to whom it belongs to do this business.
