THE committee to whom was referred the petitions of sundry insolvent debtors, beg leave to report, that they have examined the same, and are of opinion that John Rawings, Abraham Broom, John Johnson and John Iroin, of Cecil county; Thomas Elzy and John Bennett, of Somerset county; Charles Carlile, Miguel de Armas Scoreio and Andrew Estave, of Baltimore county; Josephus Burton Waters, of Montgomery; are objects of mercy, and ought to be relieved in the usual manner.

Your committee have examined the petitions of William Page, of Baltimore county, and the counter petition of William Lavelly, and are of opinion, that the said William Page did fraudulently procure the said Lavelly to endorse a bill of exchange, by which he is liable to pay the same, and to extend an act of insolvency to such an object would be to encourage fraud.

That your committee have examined the petition of Samuel Ball, of Caroline county, and the counter petition of Charles Daffin, and are of opinion that he ought not to be relieved.
