Your committee further find, that the faid George Woolf is the next of kin of the whole blood in America to the faid George Steyer, deceased, and it appears to be the intentions of the faid deceased to make him the residuary legatee.

That by the will of the faid George Steyer there is some real property bequeathed to foreigners, who are aliens to this state, and cannot inherit see-limple property by law; that it appears to your committee, that the said Philip Stock was placed at school by the said George Steyer, and intended to come to America to settle when he had similared his education.

Your committee, from the whole circumstances of the cases presented them, do recommend that a law pass to naturalize the said George Woolf, and make him a citizen at the time he came to America; and that the faid Philip Stock be naturalized and capable of holding the bequests in the faid George Steyer's will, provided he come to America in ~ - year from the date hereof, and be naturalized agreeable to the laws of this state.

All which is submitted to the honourable house.
