be The report on the petition of William Purnell, was read the second time and concurred with Mr. Faw, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of John Frederick Amelung, glass-manufacturer, of New Bremen in Frederick county, beg leave to report, that they have had the fablect of the fail petition under their confideration, and find the facts to be truly stated. In deciding on the propriety of granting the prayer of this application, your committee were necessarily led to take a comparative view of the inconveniences attending a loan of money by the public under the present embarraffed state of our finances, and the advantages to be derived from the support and encouragement of a manufacture, within the state, of an article of such general consumption as glass, from which comparison, they are induced to think that the inconveniences on the one hand, bear no proportion to the advantages on the other.

From the information your committee have received, and from the nature of the thing itself, they hope that Mr. Amelung will be able to continue this valuable manufacture without legislative affiftance; and they think it would be highly impolitic to lose the benefit of an undertaking begun on a plan so extensive, and promising, in the progress of it, such beneficial consequences to the com-

As nothing can more deserve the aid and protection of government, so nothing can be more delicate, than manufactures in their infancy. Difficult to be set on foot, they are easily destroyed; and when once subverted, the revival of them becomes far less practicable than their first establishment.

To destroy our dependence on foreigners for articles which our own country is well calculated to furnish, is, in the judgment of your committee, an object of the first importance; and, in the pursuit of this object, a small temporary evil ought, they conceive, to be cheerfully submitted to.

Your committee beg leave to suggest this further idea, that the encouragement given by the loan

and immunity prayed for to the manufacture of glass, will probably have the salutary effect of encouraging manufacturers of all kinds, by shewing a disposition in our government to use its utanish exertions in favour of such useful attempts. Upon the whole, the committee are of opinion, that the benefits to be derived from granting the petitioner's prayer so greatly overbalance the only reason against it (the necessities of government) as to render the measure politic and wise, especially as the petitioner will be content with an order on the collectors of arrears in Frederick county, and does not expect to receive the whole fum at once.

All which is submitted to the honourable house.
