T U E S D A Y, December 2, 1788.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

A petition from the justices of Frederick county, praying an act may pass for lowering the rent of tobacco inspected and received at the warehouse in Frederick-town, and to enable the justices to erect a house for the inspection of tobacco on a piece of ground the property of Frederick county, was preferred and read.

Mr. Matthews, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to make valid the proceedings of Augustine parish, in Cecil county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

A petition from James Smith, of Frederick-town, counter to the petition of the justices of Frederick county, was preferred, read, and referred, with the said petition, to Mr. Faw, Mr. Potts and Mr. Chapman, to consider and report thereon.

The report on the petition of Thomas Ruston, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house concur therewith? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. O'Neal, appeared as follow:
