A petition from Francis Clements, of Montgomery county, stating that he received a certificate from the state, for £. 69 10 3 specie, which he unfortunately lost; and praying relief in the premises; was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Seney, Mr. Oneale and Mr. Bayly, to consider

and report thereon.

A petition from Francis Clement Dyer, praying an act may pass to empower and enable Harriot Clagett, administratrix of William Clagett, deceased, to reconvey certain lands to the said Dyer, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Pinkney, Mr. R. Bowie and Mr. Lowes, to confider and report thereon.

Mr. U. Forrest appeared in the house.

A petition from John Love and Benjamin Bradford Norris, stating that they became securities for Samuel Groome Osborn, collector of the tax for 1786; that the said Osborn is considerably in arrears; that they have now in their possession, ready to be paid as a credit against the said arrears, about f. 600; that heri facias has iffued against, and been laid on, their property, for faid arrears; and praying, upon payment of the faid f. 600, the faid fieri facias may be suspended, and they authorsfed to discharge the said balance in state certificates, and to be indulged with a reasonable time for that purpose; was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Ridgely, or Wm. Mr. M'Cherlon and Mr. Seney, to confider and report thereon.

A petition from Henly Miccoy, of Charles county, stating that he was appointed deputy-collector of the taxes under Charles Mankin; that he gave security for the true performance of his duty; that finding it inconvenient, he transferred the fame to a certain Edward Scott Ware, who gave Edward Jenkins as fecurity to nim; that Ware and Jenkins have fince become infolvent, and the fiid Jenkins has the backs of balances in his possession; and praying to be empowered to take the said books, and to collect the balances; was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. M'Pherson, Mr. Craik and Mr. Stewart, to confider and report thereon.

A memorial from Francis Deakins, of Montgomery county, respecting his claim against the state for laying out the lands to the westward of Fort Cumberland, agreeably to a resolution passed April session, seventeen hundred and eighty-seven, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Seney, Mr. U. Forrest, Mr. Ridgely, of Wm. Mr. B. Worthington, Mr. Oneale and Mr. Sterett, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Sterett, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report: THE committee to whom was referred the memorial of Samuel Chase, beg leave to report, that they have confidered the faid memorial; that the facts therein stated appear to your committee to be true; and that Thomas Dorsey, mentioned in the said memorial, hath given his approbation and confent, in writing, that a law should pass according to the prayer in the said memorial; and that your committee are of opinion that it is reasonable and proper for the general assembly to grant the prayer of the faid memorial, and to pass a law accordingly. The committee beg leave to suggest, that to impose restrictions on the voluntary emancipation of slaves, is neither dictated by policy nor reconcileable with justice; that as it ought to be the wish of every free community to produce the abolition of civil slavery, and as both a sudden
