the payment of the journal of accounts paid fundry claimants their allowances, amounting to £. 32 1 6; and certificates agreeably to an act for the liquidation and payment of debts against persons convicted of treason, and British subjects, and the supplementary acts thereto, paid sundry

claimants, amounting to £. 14279 3 1012.

That your committee have counted and burnt the sum of £. 673 16 9 of the bills of credit emitted by an act of affembly of 8th June, 1780, and the sum of £. 2470 12 0 in bills of credit made by an act of congress of the 18th March, 1780.

That your committee have also examined and cancelled certificates for debts adjusted to the amount of £. 20084 13 7; certificates for continental certificates liquidated amounting to £.8597 1 1; depreciation certificates amounting to f. 12472 13 1; certificates iffued for debts against persons convicted of treason, and British subjects, to the amount of f. 9704 4 $7\frac{1}{2}$; and the surther sum of

£. 439 18 6 in journal certificates.

That it appears to your committee, by the accounts of the faid treasurer, he hath paid away from the first of November, 1788, to the first of November, 1789, the sum of £. 57261 1 4\frac{3}{4} specie; for all which payments have been produced to your committee the necessary vouchers and receipts; and that there remains in the treasury the sum of 414981 dollars and $\frac{34}{90}$ ths in sinal settlement certificates, 19400 dollars in continental loan-office certificates, £. 89994 18 9 in old continental money, and the sum of £. 17618 8 $4\frac{1}{2}$ specie, which said sum is appropriated in the following manner, viz.

For the payment of debts against persons convicted of treason, and British 954 13 668 14 01 For the payment of the journal of accounts 290 17 11 For the payment of Mellirs. That it appears to your committee there is the sum of £. 8850-in the treasury of the emission made by congress 18th March, 1780, it being part of the one tenth of the bills that became isluable in exchange of old continental money, and appropriated for the purpose of calling out of circulation the bills of credit emitted by acts of affembly, and resolves of convention, of this state.

That your committee find, by the last report, there was the sum of \mathcal{L} . 3614 8 4 in said bills remaining in the treasury, paid in on account of British creditors; that since that time the treasurer hath paid away the sum of \mathcal{L} . 96 16 6, for which have been produced to your committee the necessary vouchers and receipts; and that there remains in the treasury the sum of £. 3517 11 10.
