and taken to be a public road for ever, and shall be kept in repair in the same manner as other public roads are directed to be kept in such respective counties." After the first word "by," in the 10th line of the 2d page, insert "any person or." After the word "same," in the 11th line of the same page, strike out to the word "same," in the succeeding line, and insert "and the said valuation shall be made before the said commissioners shall proceed to open and clear the." Strike out from the word "commissioners," in the 7th line from the bottom of the same page, the intervening words to the word "it," in the succeeding line. After the word "aforesaid," in the second line from the bottom of said page, strike out the words "who before a," and insert "and free-holders shall respectively repair to some." Instead of the word "shall," in the last line of said page, insert the word "and." After the word "oath," in faid line, insert "or affirmation." After the word "swar," in the first line of the 3d page, insert "or solemnly, sincerely and truly declare and affirm." Strike out the word "same," in the 3d line of the 3d page, and insert "damages by them assessed to affested." Strike out the words "said ordination" in the 4th line of the same page, and insert "valuation assertained by the said freeholders." Strike out from the word "commissioners, or the damages affested by the said freeholders." Strike out from the word "commissioners," in the 5th line, to the end of the bill, and insert "valuation or damages to the respective parties entitled to receive the same, out of the monies to be raised and collected from the subscriptions to the said road, within the space of six months after the assertanment of such valuation or damages, and before they shall proceed to affect the lands and tenements of the person or persons concerned; provided that the said road shall not go through any houses, garden, meadow or orchard, unless with the consent of the owner thereof."
