THE committee to whom was referred the petitions of Benjamin Dashiell and William Norris, the executors of John Mitchell, and Robert Lemmon, beg leave to report, that they have taken the fame into confideration, and find that the faid Robert Lemmon hath paid into the treasury the whole amount of principal and interest for which the said Mitchell and his securities were liable to the state, in confequence whereof they have received full credit in the treasury therefor, and their bond has been delivered up to the faid Robert Lemmon, who is now in possession of it.

The committee further report, that in their opinion an execution cannot properly iffue for the state to affect the real property of the said John Mitchell, as he devised his real estate to an alien,

and died leaving an alien his heir, so that the state has a title to the same by escheat.

The committee therefore think it reasonable, that under the circumstances of the case, an act should pass directing the sale of the said property, for the purposes of discharging the claim of the said Robert Lemmon, in the first instance, in consequence of the payment asoresaid, the residue to be applied to the payment of the other debts of the said John Mitchell, in equal proportious, according to the amount of their feveral claims, and the overplus, if any, to be paid to the state, or such person as by law would be entitled to the said real estate if the same had not been sold.
