Mr. Ridgely, of Wm. brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

To the honourable the general affembly of Maryland.

THE commissioners appointed by virtue of an act, entitled, An act to dispose of the reserved lands westward of Fort Cumberland, in Washington county, and to fulfil the engagements made by this state to the officers and soldiers of the Maryland line in the service of the United States, beg leave to report, that they have proceeded in the execution of their powers, and after having taken an actual view of the different lands subject to the pre-emption of the settlers, have completed the valuation of the fame.

That agreeably to the direction of the faid act, they have distributed amongst the officers and

soldiers of the Maryland line, and their legal representatives, 2734 lots.

That they have delivered out 680 tickets, agreeably to such distribution, and that the remainder

of the tickets are in their hands.

That they have found all their attempts to fell the remaining lots ineffectual; no offers were made which they thought proper to accept, as they conceived themselves not justified in taking less than three shillings and nine-pence an acre, which sum the state affixed by law as the value of unappropriated and vacant land.

The commissioners have, in compliance with the law, made a record of all their valuations, and of the lots distributed by them amongst the officers and soldiers aforesaid, and have returned the

fame to the register of the land-office.

The commissioners beg leave to observe, that they have been obliged to refuse lots to many soldiers who they believe are entitled to them, their names not being contained in the lift furnished by the auditor-general, by which lift the commissioners are governed, and that in one instance the application of the heirs of an officer who was killed in action, has been rejected, such officer's name being omitted in the auditor's lift.
