THE house met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Mr. Parnham and Mr. Clark. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

On motion, ORDERED, That Mr. Pinkney be added to the committee appointed to consider and report on the petition of Thomas Dorsey, of Anne-Arundel county.

The bill to amend and alter sundry parts of an act of assembly passed at November session, seventeen hundred and eighty-two, entitled, An act for the more effectual paving the streets of Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Matthews brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to enable certain commissioners to make partition of a tract or parcel of land called Bohemia Manor, lying in part within Cæcil county, of this state, and part in Newcastle county, in the state of Delaware, and for other purposes therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Somervell appeared in the house.

The bill to enable certain commissioners to make partition of a tract or parcel of land called Bohemia Manor, lying in part within Cæcil county, of this state, and part in Newcastle county, in the state of Delaware, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read the second time by especial order and passed.

The report on the petition of William Alexander, was read the second time, concurred with, and thereupon,

RESOLVED, That William Alexander, of Cæcil county, may at any time, on or before the first day of March next, pay into the treasury, in depreciation or other liquidated state certificates, the amount of the balance due by him on a contract with the commissioners for the sale of confiscated property.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be authorized and directed to receive from Benjamin Bradford Norris, one of the securities of Samuel Groome Osborn, collector of the tax for Harford county for the year 1786, the certificates received by said Osborn, agreeably to an account proved on the nineteenth of October, 1789, before Bennett Bussey, one of the justices for said county, and credit the account of said collector for the principal and interest of said certificates.

Sent to the senate, with the foregoing resolution in favour of William Alexander, the bill to enable certain commissioners to make partition of a tract or parcel of land called Bohemia Manor, lying in part within Cæcil county, of this state, and part in Newcastle county, in the state of Delaware, and for other purposes therein mentioned, and the bill to repeal all those parts of an act of assembly passed at February session, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, entitled, An act to punish certain crimes and misdemeanors, and to prevent the growth of toryism, which make it necessary to take, repeat and subscribe, the oath therein mentioned, by Mr. Somervell.

The report on the petition of Peter Lawson and John D. Thompson, was read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto.

On motion, the question was put, That the bill to facilitate the draining of land, now have a second reading? Resolved in the affirmative.

On the second reading of the said bill, the question was put, That the words "the eastern shore of" be inserted after the word "of," in the second line of the first page? Determined in the negative.

The bill being read throughout, the question was put, That the same be referred to the next session of the general assembly, and published for the consideration of the people? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Oneale, appeared as follow:
