MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS,

WE have returned the bill for the removal of the seat of justice from Melvill's Warehouse to Choptank Bridge, in Caroline county, in hopes, that upon reconfideration, it will meet with your affent. It appeared to this house, not only that it was the wish of a majority of Caroline county that such a bill should pass, but that Choptank Bridge was far more convenient, in every respect, for the feat of justice, than the place where it is fixed at present, or the place prayed for by the counter petitioners.

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
