T U E S D A Y, November 16, 1790.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Lawrance Oneale and Mr. Edward Burgefs, two delegates returned for Montgomery county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government, and taking the oath to support the constitution of the United States, took their seats in the house. Mr. Gough and Mr. King appeared in the house.

Mr. M'Pherson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report :

RESOLVED, That all money received on account of arrearages of taxes due from the several collectors appointed since the first day of January, 1783, (except the two shilling and six-pence fund tax) which shall be paid into the treasury by William Campbell, the state's agent, shall be retained by the treasurer, subject to the future disposition of the general assembly.

The supplement to an act for the relief of the poor in Somerset county, was read the second time and passed.

The report on the petition of Constant Disharoon, was read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto. ORDERED, That Mr. Tilghman, Mr. Winder, and Mr. Jones, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The report on the petition of fundry insolvent debtors, was read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto. ORDERED, That Mr. M'Mechen, Mr. J. Worthington, and Mr. Tilghman, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

A petition from John Tomlinson, of Allegany county, respecting a land warrant granted under the late proprietary government, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Beatty, Mr. Rochester, and Mr. Cresap, to consider and report thereon.

A memorial from John and Walter Hanson, of Charles county, praying that certain bonds given by them to the state may be cancelled, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Parnham, Mr. Plater, and Mr. Craik, to consider and report thereon.

On the second reading the bill to establish a bank in Baltimore-town, agreeably to the order of the day, the question was put, That the words "capias ad satisfaciendum" be struck out? Determined in the negative.

The bill being read throughout, the question was put, That the said bill do pass? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Oneale, appeared as follow :
