RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the eastern shore do receive of George Bird, late collector of the tax in Cæcil county, the sum of seventeen pounds sixteen shillings and six-pence of red money as specie, and that he the said George Bird have a credit on the treasurer's books for said sum.
