So it was resolved in the affirmative.

The bill for the removal of the seat of justice from Melville's warehouse to Pig Point, in Caroline county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by Mr. King.

Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esquire, from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill for the benefit of Nicholas Merryman, of Baltimore county, endorsed; "By the senate, November 24, 1790: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The amendments to the bill to repeal certain parts of the act to prevent disabled and superannuated slaves being set free, were read the second time, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The report on the petition of fundry merchants and traders, respecting auctions in Baltimore-town, was read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto. ORDERED, That Mr. Smith, Mr. M'Mechen, Mr. Tilghman, Mr. Ridgely, and Mr. Lethrbury, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

On motion, the question was put, That the purchasers of Ebenezer Mackie's confiscated property be released therefrom, and that the said property be restored to the said Ebenezer Mackie in the same manner as if it never had been confiscated; and that the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed to deliver to the said Mackie his bond now in the office for one third of said property, purchased by him at a resale, on condition that the said Mackie pay to the treasurer aforesaid the amount of all expences which this state may have incurred by reason of the confiscation, sale and resale, of the said property, and all expences incurred by the state in any suit or suits at law, or in equity, on account of the said property? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Parnham, appeared as follow:
