The report on the petition of sundry inhabitants of Queen-Anne's and Caroline counties, was read the second time, concurred with, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant thereto.

Mr. Tilghman brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the draining of a marsh and branch known by the name of the Long Marsh, lying in Queen-Anne's and Caroline counties; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The report on the petition of John and Walter Hanson, was read the second time, and rejected.
