Amendments proposed. After the preamble in the first page, insert the following sections: "Be it enacted, by the general affembly of Maryland, That the clerk of the senate, and the clerk of the house of delegates, shall furnish the printer of the state for the time being with a correct copy of the votes and proceedings of their respective houses, and of the several laws and resolutions passed and asfented to during the present or any future session of assembly, within the space of thirty days after the end of every such session, and shall take a receipt from the printer for the same; and every clerk of the senate or of the house of delegates, who shall refuse or neglect to comply with the directions of this act, shall forfeit and pay the sum of twenty pounds current money for every resultal or neglect, to be recovered and applied in the fame manner as other penalties and forfeitures.

" And be it enacted, That the printer of the state for the time being, shall immediately on the receipt of the faid votes and proceedings, and of the faid laws and refolutions, proceed to print and slitch them in the fame manner as hath been heretofore accustomed, and shall print and slitch and pack up, under the direction of the governor and council, as many copies thereof as shall be sufficient for the following persons and purposes; that is to say, one copy of the laws and resolutions, and one copy of the votes and proceedings of each branch of the legislature, for the governor and council, and for each member of the general affembly; one copy of the laws and resolutions, well bound in blue boards, and four copies of the faid votes and proceedings, for the clerk of each respective county, to be deposited in his office for the use of the county courts, and for the inspection and information of the people; one copy of the laws and resolutions for each of the judges and justices of the peace
