On motion, ORDERED, That the bill proposing to the creditors of this state to subscribe to the loan proposed by the congress of the United States, and respecting the mode of payment of certain debts due to this state, have a second reading to-morrow morning.

The resolution in favour of Elizabeth Dorsey, executrix of Thomas Dorsey, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate by Mr. J. Worthington.

To the honourable the GENERAL ASSEMBLY of MARYLAND.
The REPORT of WILLIAM CAMPBELL, agent of the state for superintending the collection of all arrearages and balances due from the several collectors of the respective counties appointed since the first of January, 1783.

YOUR agent begs leave to submit to your honours a statement of his proceedings in the execution of his duty, contained in the papers enclosed.

No. 1 states the several balances delivered him by the treasurer of the western shore, and the interest he has required from the several collectors of the said shore, to cover charges, amounting in the whole to the sum of £. 49,536 19 9; it states also the payments which have been made thereon, amounting to the sum of £. 32,599 16 3.

No. 2 states the several balances delivered him by the treasurer of the eastern shore, and the interest in like manner required, amounting in the whole to the sum of £. 17,397 1 8; it states likewise the payments made thereon, amounting to £. 6336 0 8. It appears therefore, that the balances and interest aforesaid, of both shores, amount to the sum of £. 66,933 1 5, and the payments to the sum of £. 38,935 16 1.

No. 3. Shews the list of balances due on the 1st instant.

He considers it his duty to remark, that several of the balances in the aforesaid lists, cannot be collected without great difficulty and attention, and that perhaps a considerable part of them may be finally lost. For more particular information, he refers your honours to the paper No. 4.

He begs leave further to remark, that he has received from the governor and the council, bonds and notes to the amount of £. 759 5 9 to be collected. The parts thereof which have been paid, will be stated in his general account.

He had likewise intrusted to him, to be sold, certain property which had been purchased for the state by the late agents; but, as he has considered the collectors answerable for any loss that may be sustained on a resale, he has not thought it necessary to trouble your honours on that subject, further than by a reference to the names, which he has taken the liberty to mention in No. 4.
