Ordered to be engrossed. And the supplement to an act, entitled, An act respecting the collectors of the taxes since the first of January, 1783, endorsed; "December 21, 1790: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table."

"By order, H. RIDGELY, jun. clk." Amendments proposed. After the word "discharge" in the 8th line of the third page, it further enacted, That the state agent be empowered to allow the several collectors for amount of all sums charged against them as arise from property belonging to subjects of France, and exempted by law from taxation.

"Be it further enacted, That the said agent shall have power to compound with the several and the securities of Thomas Boyer, of Kent county, and Samuel Groome Ofgood, of Talbot county, for the balances by them respectively due, upon such terms as he may think proper for the service of the state.

"Be it further enacted, That the said agent be authorized and directed to collect the several forfeitures and amerciaments, due from the sheriffs of the several counties, and to apply the same to the use of money received for marriage licenses, and other purposes, by the clerks of the respective counties.

"Be it further enacted, That the said agent, in the execution of this act, and of the original act, shall keep distinct accounts of his proceedings respecting the several matters aforesaid, and shall report thereof to the next general assembly for their inspection and examination.

Which were read. RESOLVED, That Christopher Richmond be and he is appointed a commissioner for this state, to superintend the settlement of the accounts of this state with the United States; and that the said Christopher Richmond shall be allowed, for his and a clerk's services, during the time he shall be employed in his agency, at the rate of six hundred pounds current money per annum.

RESOLVED, That the two shillings and six-penny fund tax imposed by the act, entitled, An act to establish funds to secure the payment of the state debt, and for the annual payment of the interest thereon, passed at November session, 1784, which shall be due for the year 1791, shall be paid by the people, and by the collectors, in specie only.
