Mr. Goldsborough, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report: THE committee to whom was referred the petition of Rhode Phillips, of Dorchefter county, beg leave to report, that it appears to your committee that John Phillips, late of Dorchester county, deceased, husband of the petitioner, was seized in see of several tracts of land lying in Somerset county, on which said several tracts of land the said John Phillips, in his life-time, obtained a warrant of refurvey, and that, in purfuance of faid warrant, the faid feveral tracts were refurveyed, and certificate of faid refurvey returned in the name of faid John Phillips to the western shore land-office, for a tract of land called Phillips's Farewel, containing nine hundred and fix and one half acres of land.
