counts passed and paid to individuals the sum of two thousand and twenty-five pounds nine shillings

and fix-pence halfpenny, in certificates issued by the treasurer of the western shore.

That under a resolution of the general assembly, passed at November session, 1791, for extending the time for granting depreciation to the officers and soldiers of the Maryland quota of troops in the service of the United States, there hath been issued to the amount of sour thousand and ninety. five pounds three shillings and three-pence certificates, bearing interest from the first of August, 1780, agreeably to the directions of the aforesaid resolution.
