S A T U R D A Y, December 22, 1792.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Plowden. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill in favour of the president and directors of the Patowmack company, and the commissioners of the federal buildings, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Whereas the chancellor of Maryland, by his decree made at October term, seventeen hundred and ninety-one, did, amongst other things, order and direct, that the bonds passed to the state of Maryland by William Slade, James Denny and David Wiley, should be delivered up to the said William Slade, James Denny and David Wiley, to be cancelled, and that the state of Maryland should refund to the complainants respectively all money or other things by them paid to the state of Maryland, or the value thereof; therefore, RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed to deliver up to the said William Slade, James Denny and David Wiley, or either of them, their bonds, to be cancelled, and that he refund to them all money or other things by them paid to the state of Maryland.

Sent to the senate by the clerk.

On motion, ORDERED, That 300 copies of the act for the valuation of real and personal property within this state, be immediately printed by the printer of the state, and delivered to the sheriff of Anne-Arundel county, to be forwarded, as public letters, to the commissioners of the tax in the several counties.
