

ern shore at the expence of the obligors; and a copy of the said record, certified under the hand and official seal of the said clerk, shall be as good evidence in any court of law or equity in this state as the original bond would be if it was produced; and if any of the obligors in any such bonds reside on the eastern shore, the said treasurer shall, within six months from the time he receives the same, respectively, transmit to the clerk of the general court of the eastern shore, in the same manner that papers on public service are transmitted, a copy of such bonds and schedules, certified as aforesaid by the clerk of the general court of the western shore, to be recorded in the office of the clerk of the general court of the eastern shore, at the expence of the obligors, and, in such case, a copy of the said record, certified as aforesaid by the clerk of the general court of the eastern shore, shall be good evidence as aforesaid." Page 6, 7th line from the bottom, strike out the words "and for other purposes."

Which were read the first and second time, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The engrossed bills No. 76, 77, 78 and 79, were severally read and assented to, and sent to the senate, with the paper bills thereof, by the clerk.
