At the end of the bill insert the following clause: "And be it enacted, That at the next election of commissioners for the said town there shall be elected four additional commissioners, so as to make the number hereafter nine instead of five commissioners, which said commissioners shall arrange themselves in classes, and three of their number, from time to time hereafter, shall go out, and the like number be re-elected in their stead, at the same time, and in the like manner, as the said elections are regulated by the law to which this is a supplement, and all provisions in the said law incompatible hereto, are hereby declared to be repealed and annulled."

Which was read.

The further consideration of the bill relating to public roads in this state, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and the order of the day respecting the bill to declare and explain the law in certain cases, are postponed till to-morrow morning.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.
